Link of Adventist Education to Continuous School Improvement and Accreditation

• *Link of Adventist Education to Continuous School Improvement*

The Continuous School Improvement (CSI) Cycle, a research-based framework centered on data analysis, lays the ground work for the link between the J2E principles and the accreditation process. This approach involves transition from an “event” or compliance mindset to a commitment to “continuous school improvement.” The annual CSI Cycle is organized around the following components: Data Analysis, Mission, Vision/CSI Plan, Implementation Strategies, Evaluation.

Continuous School Improvement Planning occurs in response to data analysis and the identified needs of the school program, with the goal of creating a shared vision which is implemented in a Continuous School Improvement Plan. Most importantly, the mission of Adventist education is the lens through which program change is managed and evaluated

The CSI Framework is designed to help schools address and answer five key questions through staff engagement and collaboration:

1. Where are we now?
 2. How did we get to where we are?
 3. Where do we want to be?
 4. How are we going to get to where we want to be?
 5. Is what we are doing making a difference?

In addition to a commitment to Continuous School Improvement, achieving excellence requires quality assurance with energies and resources directed towards the improvement of teaching and learning within a standards-based framework. Standards are ideals for quality programs that are specific, attainable, and measurable. They describe an effective program that leads to Continuous School Improvement and results in improved student learning.

The [Standards for Accreditation of Seventh-day Adventist Schools](#) is a dynamic, research-based tool designed to assist schools in the process of self-assessment that is context-specific, evidence-informed, and outcomes-focused. The steps outlined in the document provide all schools with a robust structure for reflecting upon programs and practices, raising quality,

achieving excellence, and delivering better outcomes for our learners and their families. In this process, the instrument provides a focus through which schools evaluate the extent to which they are meeting stakeholder expectations; delivering on system, school, and community priorities; and implementing strategic goals and initiatives.

Standards have been established for the four Journey to Excellence domains: PURPOSE, PLAN, PRACTICE, PRODUCT.
