Bear Valley CSD prepares for winter weather

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End-of-year project update

Good evening Bear Valley Springs. We would like to update you on several community enhancing projects that have begun, are in process and will be starting shortly. We here at BVS are certainly blessed

with a group of hard-working, committed and knowledgeable maintenance folks. We have gone from paying outside contractors, to bringing the majority of our remodels and retrofits in-house, thus affording the membership financial savings.

When we save money and utilize our own workers, we avoid overages, delays and have a better handle on quality con-

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trol. This allows us to address more areas in need of repair or maintenance and address them sooner, rather than later.

Some of the projects that have been completed at the time of this writing are as follows:

A new John Deere tractor was purchased for the equestrian center to replace the aging, leaking and noisy one we have been using. We are also in the process of testing and obtaining bids for a new side-by-side, also to replace an aging unit at

the equestrian center.

The Whiting Center game room is in the process of being painted, adding new carpet and updating the furniture for a more up to date look and usability.

The Oak Tree Country Club exterior has been recently painted to include the repair of the rotted and missing fascia. We went with a two-tone color scheme to add some depth and character. You know the old Bear Valley Brown just wasn't

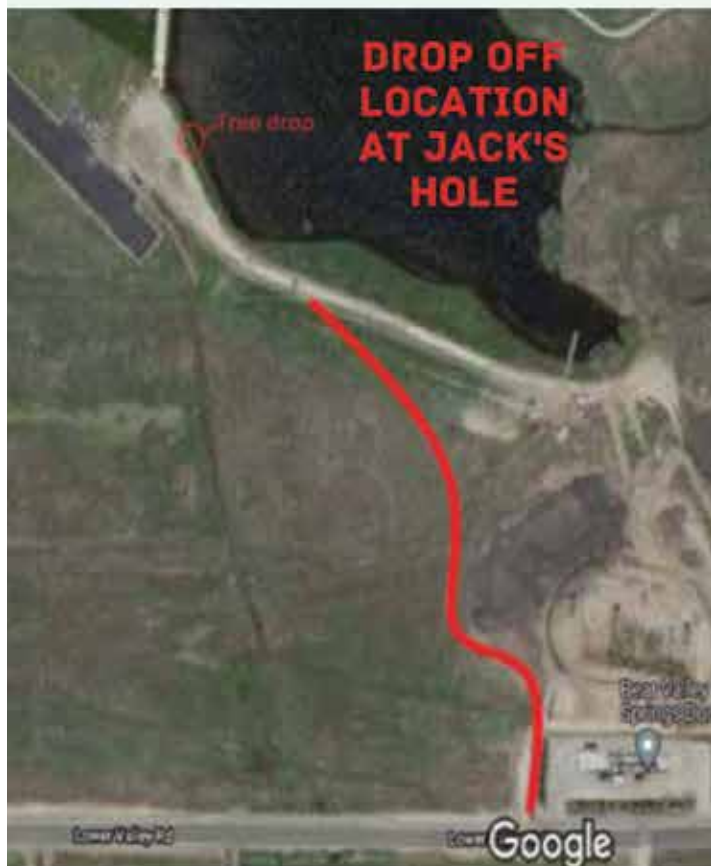
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BVCSD Directors approve engineering study for road repair project

The Bear Valley Community Services District Board of Directors has approved the next step in a critical road project for our community.

At the Dec. 12 Board Meeting, Directors voted unanimously to contract with Provost and Pritchard Consulting Group to provide an engineering study for Bear Valley Road and Cumberland Road rehabilitation and preservation. The overall project will include road repaving on Bear Valley from the front gate to Oakflat Drive, repaving on Bear Valley from Bay Court to Martingale Way, and road preservation on Bear Valley Road and Cumberland Road.

The project will also include the replacement of underground service lines.



The engineering study will provide critical data needed to identify the best approaches and create a timeline for each of the affected sections of road.

Once the engineering study is complete, the CSD will have a final cost for the project and will move into the construction planning phase. The CSD will share a construction timeline as soon as it is available. 🐾

Public viewing dates for 2025 announced

The BVS Astronomy Club holds a public star party on a roughly monthly schedule. These weather-dependent events are intended to provide an opportunity for any interested BVS resident to look through a telescope at the Moon, the evening planets and some of the brighter objects in the sky. The star parties are scheduled on the Saturday evening closest to the first quarter Moon and so vary a bit due to the shorter lunar month. First quarter phase is purposefully chosen to show off the Moon, which is both very bright and easy for novices to see in a telescope.

We are often asked, why don't we schedule the public nights around full Moon? The full Moon rises at sunset and remains low in the sky through the evening hours, while the first quarter Moon is well placed high in the sky. Also, lunar shadows from its mountains and craters are the longest during first quarter. (New Moon weekends are reserved for the club's dark sky star party, where we seek out the faint fuzzy, difficult to see objects like nebulae and galaxies.)

The public viewing nights are normally held at the Cub Lake Basketball Court unless its flooded, muddy or being used for another event. In that case, we usually move up to the cul-de-sac by the Cub Lake bathrooms.

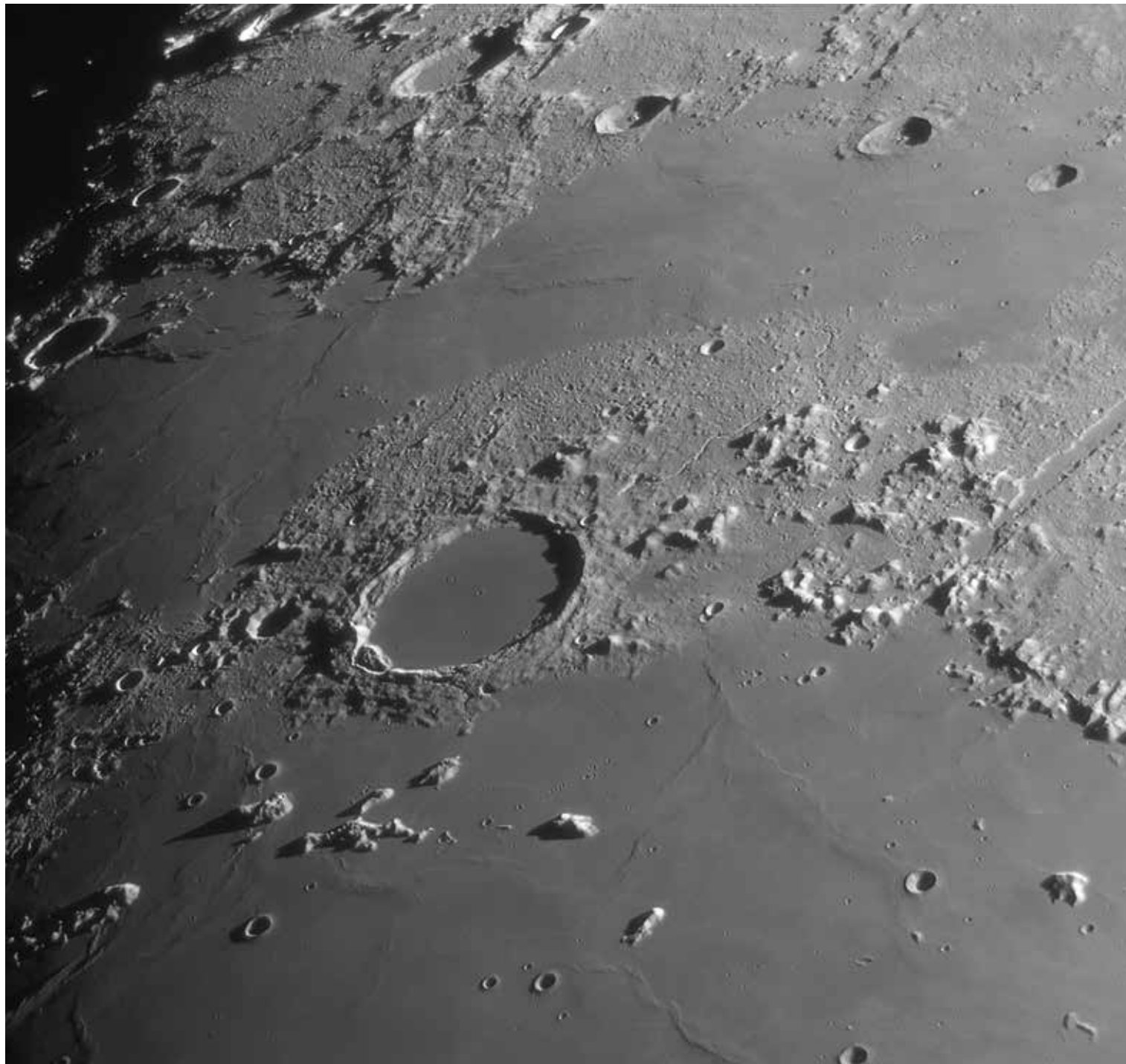

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Winter weather preparations

On Nov. 15, Bear Valley got its first taste of snow for the season. Roads were restricted to four-wheel drive and/or chains, Bear Valley Police helped several drivers who got stuck, and our snowplow teams were out in full force to keep our streets as safe as possible.

Now that we're in January, we know more snow days are in our future. CSD teams are ready to respond as soon as snow starts falling, but there are critical steps you can take to make this winter as safe as possible:

- Sign up for Nixle (www.bvcsd.org/nixle). During snow events, we will be sending regular alerts on road conditions through Nixle. Those alerts will also be published on our website, the front gate marquee, and CSD social media sites, but Nixle is the best tool for immediate alerts.

- If snow is in the forecast, we request that you move all vehicles or other obstructions away from the roads. Our plow crews cannot properly remove snow when the roads and shoulders are obstructed, and we also want to avoid the possibility of accidentally damaging personal property.

- If you are driving in the snow or ice and get stuck, or reach a point where you can't proceed further:

- If you can do so safely, turn around and go back the way you came

- Move as far to the side of the road as safely possible
 - Turn on your emergency lights
 - Wait until snow removal equipment clears a path
 - If your engine is running and snow is piling up, check your tailpipe occasionally to make sure it is clear

- If your destination is nearby and it is safe to do so, you may leave your car and walk until it clears up enough to retrieve your vehicle

- Contact the Public Works Department so we can alert our snow removal teams about stuck vehicles:

- o During regular business hours (8AM-430PM): 661-821-4428

- o After hours: 661-805-9255

- o Do not contact Bear Valley police unless there

is an emergency

- We also recommend you have emergency supplies in your vehicle, including:

- Warm clothes
- Blankets
- Food and water
- Ice Scraper, small shovel, snow brush
- Flashlight
- First-aid kit
- Phone charger



- Jumper Cables
- Tire chains
- Flares and/or road triangles
- A bag of sand or cat litter

- Do not use private snowplows on CSD-maintained roads, they are not permitted.

Please be aware that our snow removal teams' priority will be to clear the main arteries on the valley floor. It will take longer for our teams to reach streets at higher elevations.

We thank you all for working with us to make sure we have a safe, comfortable snow season! 🐾

popping out, so we added a darker trim color, but stayed within the community rules and guidelines. Thank you to the ECC committee for allowing some creativity to the project.

The outdoor patio furniture at the pool will be undergoing a makeover since the current loungers, after six years in the sun, are tearing and fading. The cost of the old lounge was \$334 per unit in 2019. We have

88 units and to replace them at today's price would be \$1,100 per unit. The units are structurally solid with the exception of the Sunbrella material that is tearing and becoming worn. We have contracted a local upholstery shop to remove the old material and replace it with new Sunbrella material (same material and color) at a fraction of the cost.

We are replacing the old and faded parking signs with new ones; the signs will have the

BVSA rule visible. Our Rangers will be issuing warnings for those who park in areas that are not designated for parking or parking within handicap spots without proper plates or plaques. We are attempting to make sure the people who need those spots have them available when they visit the amenities.

In 2024, the projects that we completed (we being the board of directors, the staff and you, the membership) new asphalt in three main parking lots, equestrian center main parking area and camping area, asphalt on the golf cart path and driveway leading to the Mulligan Room. The entire 44,000 square feet of the pool deck area were resurfaced with a 10-year guarantee. The tennis pavilion was repainted and new fencing installed around the perimeter.

The trees around Four Island Lake were trimmed and removed to increase the safety and aesthetics. Lastly, but very importantly, a memorial table with trees at Four Island Lake was constructed in honor of a family.

There are many more items that were addressed and repaired throughout the year that are utilized in the day-to-day operations. A big thank you to our maintenance crew who keeps us running and repaired. A super big thank you to our janitorial staff who keeps BVSA amenities beautiful year-round!

We at BVSA wish you a very healthy, happy and prosperous 2025 and look forward to continuing to improve and maintain BVS for everybody's enjoyment into the future. 🐾

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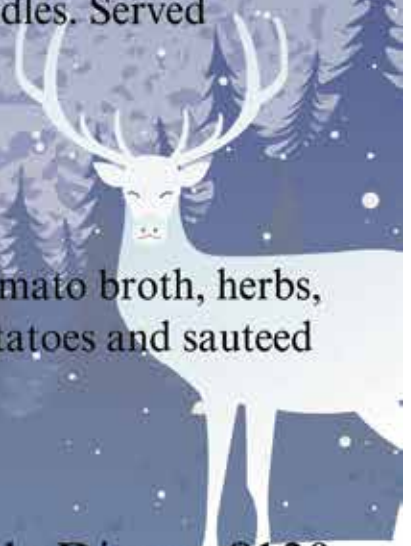
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TEXT OF PROPOSED CHANGES to BVSA Rules

(Deletions are shown in ~~striketrough~~ type and additions in **bold underlined** type)

ARTICLE 11

SWIMMING POOL

(Adopted 7/9/88)

SECTION 1100. HOURS OF OPERATION

Hours of operation are established by the Board and **management and** may be changed without prior notice. Operating times are posted ~~in the recreation brochure and~~ on the website.

SECTION 1101. ATTIRE

As we are a family-oriented facility; proper and modest swimsuits are required as determined by the pool supervisor or higher management. The only authorized swimwear in the pool is commercially sold swimwear (i.e. bathing suits, rash guards, sun guards, etc.). "Cut-off pants and anything that restricts mobility below the waist" are prohibited. Cotton products are strongly discouraged. **No thong bikinis or solid one briefs will be allowed in the pool area during open swim hours.** *(Amended 10/20/14)*

SECTION 1102. POOL RULES

- (a) Running, horseplay and roughhousing are prohibited at all times.
- (b) Diving is permissible ONLY at the deep end.
- (c) Use of the pool by children 13 years of age and under is permitted ONLY when accompanied by a parent or other responsible adult. The parent or other responsible adult must remain to supervise the children their entire stay in the pool.

1. Lifeguard or Pool supervisor may at any time administer a swim test for anyone under the age of 13. Swim test will consist of 25M swim in a continuous manner with stopping forward progress. Results of swim test may require child to wear coast guard approved swim vest or have parent in water at all times within arm's reach.

(Amended 8/10/08, 10/20/14)

- (d) Entering the pool using flips and twists is prohibited. The pool steps shall remain clear and unobstructed for entrance and exit during open swim. Sliding down the handrail ~~shall be~~ **is** prohibited.
- (e) Sitting on the shoulders of another swimmer is ~~disallowed~~ **prohibited**.
- (f) Face masks are prohibited in the pool area.
- (g) Glass products of any kind are prohibited in the pool and pool area.
- (h) No gum, spitting, spouting, nose-blowing or urinating in the pool or pool area.

- (i) Use of vulgar or profane language in the pool area is prohibited.
- (j) All pets are prohibited in the pool area.
- (k) The use of roller skates, bicycles, skateboards and similar equipment is prohibited at all times in the pool area, adjacent deck areas, or walks leading to the pool.
- (l) Flotation devices will not be permitted in the pool with the exception of U.S. Coast Guard approved flotation devices and infant seats ~~with~~ **while** a parent **is** within ~~five feet~~ **arm's-reach**.
- (m) All persons are required to rinse off before entering pool.
- (n) Anyone injured, or who sees a person injured while using the pool, should immediately notify the lifeguard for assistance.
- (o) No Smoking **or vaping** as provided in Article 20 Smoking (as defined in Article 20, Section 2003) at Association Operated Facilities SECTION 2000. COMPLETE BAN, subsection (f), The Swimming Pool Area. **Marijuana use prohibited.** *(Amended 06/10/16)*
(Amended and Added subsections (d), (e), (f), (g), (h), (i), (j), (k), (l), (m), (n), and (o) 10/20/14)

SECTION 1103. FOOD AND BEVERAGES

- (a) Food or beverage brought into the pool area by Members, their families and their guests must consist only of snack-type foods in unbreakable, non-glass containers. Food and beverages shall not be consumed while in the pool. Ice chests, coolers and similar containers shall not be brought into the pool area. *(Amended 4/21/01, 01/10/08, 10/20/14)*
- (b) Members, their families and their guests are prohibited from bringing their own alcoholic beverages into the pool area. *(Amended 4/21/01)*
- (c) Trash, debris and garbage must be placed in the containers provided. Every effort must be made to keep the pool free of these items.
(Amended 10/20/14 and moved subsections (d) and e) to Section 1102)

SECTION 1104. MEMBER RESPONSIBILITIES

- (a) Members are responsible for their family, their guests, including any family members of guests to assure compliance with these rules *(Amended 8/10/08)*
- (b) ~~Radios, cassette players~~ **Electronic audio devices** and similar equipment may be played ONLY in a manner that will not annoy others. The Association may control or deny use of this equipment.
- (c) When in and around pool area, children under fourteen years of age must be accompanied at all times by an adult. *(Amended 8/10/08)*
- (d) When in and around pool area, any person who cannot swim must be accompanied at all times by a person who can swim. *(Amended 8/10/08)*

(e) ~~BVS Aquatics (to be limited to Lap Swimmers and Aquafit persons), w~~When a lifeguard is not present, during off season you must be a member of the BVS Aquatics Club and ~~must~~ meet the following criteria:

~~1) Lap swimming is only for BVS property owners, renters with current amenity privileges, or guests of therefore stated.~~

~~1-2) Lap swimmers and Aquafit persons must have an annual signed, current liability form on file with the Association, and attend an annual off-season pool orientation session and be on the registered roster.~~

A. A lap swim guest must sign a liability form, pay their guest fee and the BVSA Aquatics Club member sponsor must be present with the guest at the pool.

~~2 3) Since there is no lifeguard on duty present,~~ lap swimming children under 18 years of age, must have an adult present as well as a current liability form signed by their parent or guardian.

~~3. A. Children under age 14 not allowed in the pool area who are not swimming must have their parent or guardian on the pool deck.~~

4) Lap swimming is for individuals in continuous movement from one end of the pool to the other. Limit in-pool work-out recovery time as necessary and share lanes when people are waiting to lap swim.

5) Swimming alone is not permissible.

6) Keep gate locked upon entering and exiting.

(Amended and Renumbered 10/20/14 moved subsections (e) through (i) to Section 1102)

7) Upon entering pool area, unlock guardhouse for emergency phone access and sign in.

8) When exiting the pool area, cover the pool, turn off lights in the restrooms, lock guardhouse and gate.

9) There will be no swimming when the pool decks are icy or during inclement weather. *(Added 6/10/11)*

SECTION 1105. MANAGEMENT RESPONSIBILITIES

(a) The Pool Supervisor or Head Lifeguard has authority to close the pool during bad weather without prior notice. The lifeguard will close the pool at first indication of lightning. *(Amended 10/20/14)*

(b) Amenity Manager, with concurrence of the General Manager may establish a period of special activity use of the pool by Members and guests. *(Amended 01/10/08, 08/10/08)*

(c) The wearing of bathing suits is prohibited in the main OTCC buildings. Persons desiring to use the pool must enter the pool area via the west entrance located adjacent to the tennis courts. *(Amended 01/10/08)*

(d) Persons attired in swimwear should use the restrooms provided in the pool locker rooms. *(Amended 8/10/08, Amended 10/20/14)*

SECTION 1106. ENFORCEMENT

(a) The lifeguard, when present, has supervisory and

enforcement functions as well as lifesaving duties. In order to assure appropriate behavior and safety of the persons using the pool and pool area, lifeguards have the authority to issue orders that may or may not be covered in the afore stated rules. *(Amended 10/20/14)*

(b) Any person who fails to obey these Rules or the direct orders of the Amenity Manager or his/her designee ~~or the lifeguard on duty~~ will be "benched" or directed to leave the pool area. *(Amended 10/20/14)*

(c) This Article will be enforced as provided in Article 17 and Article 3. *(Amended 12/10/13)*

Purpose and Effect of Proposed Rule Change

Changes proposed by the BVSA Rules Committee for clarification and cooperative purposes.

TEXT OF ADOPTED CHANGES TO ECC Rules

*(Deletions are shown in strikethrough type and additions in **bold underlined** type)*

SECTION 103. Occupation and Special Use Permits

No gainful occupation, profession or trade shall be maintained, conducted or carried on upon on any residential lot or in any improvement or other structure on any residential lot without the prior written approval of the ECC. *[C&Rs, Para. 7.b(6),(16)]*

A. Obtaining Approval.

Only occupations, trades or professions that do not interfere with the quiet and peaceful use, occupation and enjoyment of other Owners of their lots and the Common Areas will be permitted. All occupations, trades and professions permitted by the ECC shall be conducted and carried on in strict conformance with the conditions that may be imposed on such permit or approval, and any such permit or approval may be revoked in writing by the ECC upon a failure of the permittee to comply with any such conditions. The Occupational agreement between the permittee and his/her client(s) is a business relationship and must be conducted within the confines of said permittee's property. Owners and other residents may obtain the required approval forms at the BVSA office.

B. Garage/Yard Sales

Garage or yard sales may be conducted on a residential lot with the prior written approval of the ECC.

1. An Environmental Control Committee permit is required ~~and must be approved prior to the garage/yard sale.~~ **No permits will be accepted the day of or day before the proposed garage sale date**

2. Only Association issued garage/yard sale signs are permitted and they must be returned to the BVSA office on the next business day following the completion of the garage/

yard sale. Unauthorized signs may be removed immediately without prior notice to the property owner. Removed signs will be stored at the Association office for a period of five days; thereafter, they will be discarded. (Revised 12/15/12) (Amended 10/01/19)

3. All garage/yard sale items are to be removed by sunset on the last day of the sale. (Added 12/15/12) (Amended 10/01/19)

4. A partially refundable fee will be charged at the time of the application in accordance with the Association Fee Schedule. The refundable portion of the fee will be refunded after the completion of the sale upon return of the garage/yard sale signs in ~~satisfactory condition~~ **the condition received**. Failure to comply with the ECC Rules regarding garage/yard sales may result in disciplinary action as outlined in Section 601 of the ECC Rules.

5. No more than three (3) garage/yard sales will be allowed per calendar year, per residential lot. Sales may not be held on two consecutive weekends. (Revised 10/1/2021)

6. Sales are to be no longer than three days, nor can they be

held on Association recognized holidays.

7. Signs may be posted the evening before the sale begins and must be removed by sunset the last day of the sale. (Revised 12/15/12)

8. Flags, pennants, balloons, etc. will not be permitted in conjunction with signs.

9. Cars may not be parked so that they obstruct the normal flow of traffic or interfere with other adjoining property owner's access to their property.

10. The Association will not be responsible for the safety of anyone participating in or attending the sale.

11. Any damage or nuisance caused by the person's holding the sale; their families, other participants or people attending the sale will be the responsibility of the property owner.

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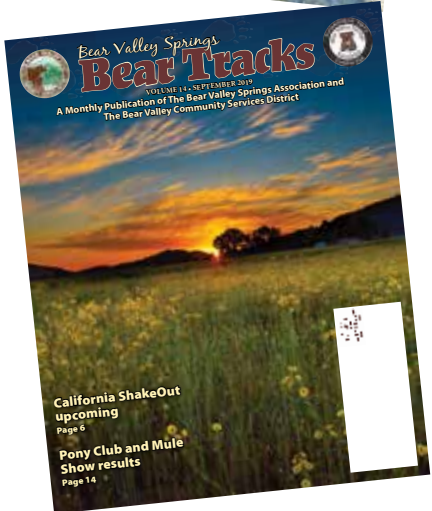
