Bear Valley Dark Sky Preservation, part 2

Last month we discussed the current lighting restrictions in Bear Valley Springs that are meant to keep our nights dark, allow us to enjoy nature, and live in balance with the wildlife that surrounds us. This month let us talk about how we can go beyond the rules to make our homes even more night sky friendly.

Are the current ECC rules enforced?

Currently the rules are weakly enforced. No one wants to be told what to do with their property and enforcement personnel do not like having to enforce the restrictions unless there is a complaint. These articles are an attempt to promote dark skies in a friendly manner. If we know what we can do to



improve things, we will.

Is there more we can do?

Absolutely yes! We can all be better neighbors than the rules require, they are just the minimum requirements. Here is what we can do beyond the rules.

1. Exterior lighting must be turned off by 10:30, but we can turn them off earlier if we are not outside using them. Light-

ing our properties when no one is out or expected to arrive is simply a waste of electricity.

2. Use warm colored lights for all outdoor lighting. The

2025 – 2026 Golf cart policy for Bear Valley Springs amenity locations

All golf carts / recreational vehicles either gas or electric are subject to the Bear Valley Springs Policies regarding use on all BVS properties. BVS properties include but are not limited to:

- 1. Golf course, to include any and all cart paths
- 2. Four Island Lake
- 3. Cub Lake
- 4. Parking lots to include, Mulligan Room, Administrative office, maintenance yard, driving range and roadway leading to golf shop / Mulligan room.
- 5. Whiting Center parking lot
- 6. Equestrian Center to include the parking and camping areas
- 7. Oak Tree Country Club parking area
- 8. Tennis and pickleball courts parking lot and areas
- 9. Pool and BBQ areas adjacent to the horseshoe pits and sand volley ball court.
- 10. Nature / walking paths, dog park, RC airplane and car areas.
- 11. Beaubien Field, Adams Field and Warne Field.
- 12. Gun range, archery range or shotgun range.

No recreational cart or golf cart shall be driven or parked upon BVSA amenities unless the member(s) have paid the annual fee of \$75 and submitted a current specific golf cart / recreational vehicle insurance certificate to include indemnification of the association. No recreational vehicle or golf cart shall be operated by a person not in possession of a valid California Drivers license or other valid out of state license while on BVSA properties.

All golf carts / recreational vehicles shall not exceed the speed of $\underline{\mathbf{10MPH}}$ on any amenity property or traversing any amenity property. All golf carts / recreational vehicles if travelling at night will be required to have adequate lighting, visible from both the front and rear of the cart or recreational vehicle,

Violations of these policies may result in member discipline to include a written reprimand, notice to correct, or fines and suspension by the Board of directors, after a formal hearing.

Golf carts and recreational vehicles will only allow enough riders to conform to the seating capability of the cart or recreational vehicle. The maximum number of riders will be determined by seating capacity. No standing on, leaning out or crowding into the cart or recreational vehicle will be allowed. This will be a violation subject to member discipline as described in the previous paragraph.

Golf cart / recreational vehicles will not be allowed to park in a parking spot designed for a motor vehicle, no carts will be parked in handicap spots (unless a handicap flag or placard is visible), in "No parking areas" and within "fire lanes".

CSD Board approves Ad Hoc Committee for a police tax study

3/28/2025 - At the March 27 CSD Board Meeting, the Board of Directors made a declarative statement that they support the Bear Valley Police Department for the foreseeable future. Board members voted unanimously to issue the statement.

The Board of Directors also approved the formation of an Ad Hoc Committee for a Police Tax Study in a 4-1 vote. The Ad Hoc Committee will consist of two board members and up to five volunteer community members. It is charged with conducting a financial analysis on the current per-parcel tax to fund law enforcement in Bear Valley to determine the funding needed by the CSD, as well as evaluating the framework and requirements needed to place a tax measure on a future ballot. The Ad Hoc Committee will also make recommendations to the board on an oversight and accountability framework.

The Resolution calls for the Ad Hoc Committee to have all assigned tasks completed by the first CSD Board of Directors



meeting in December 2025. All findings and recommendations made by the Committee will be presented to the full Board

of Directors, which will then decide what actions will be taken.

Stay safe and have fun: Swimming safety at Four Island Lake and Bear Valley Pool

As the weather warms up, families and friends head outdoors to enjoy the water—and in Bear Valley, two favorite spots top the list: Four Island Lake and the Bear Valley Pool.

Whether you're spending the afternoon swimming laps at the pool or relaxing by the lakeshore, both places offer great opportunities for fun, fitness, and fresh air.

But before you dive in, it's important to keep water safety in mind. Drowning remains a leading cause of accidental injury and death, especially for children. The good news?

Most water-related accidents are preventable with just a few simple precautions.

Always Swim with a Buddy

No matter where you're swimming at the lake or the pool, never go alone. Even experienced swimmers can run into trouble with fatigue, cramps, or sudden changes in water depth.

Children should always be under the watchful eye of a responsible adult. If you're part of a group, assign a dedicated "water watcher" to keep an eye on swimmers without distractions like phones or conversations.

Understand the Environment

Swimming at Four Island Lake means enjoying nature, but natural bodies of water have their own unique risks. The lakebed may be uneven or slippery, and underwater hazards like rocks, branches, or sudden drop-offs can be hard to see.

Avoid diving unless you know the area is clear and deep enough.

At the Bear Valley Pool, take a moment to check depth markers and posted rules. Be cautious near pool edges and avoid diving in shallow areas. Following posted guidelines and listening to the lifeguards can go a long way in preventing accidents.

Use the Right Gear

If you or someone in your group isn't a strong swimmer, wear a U.S. Coast Guard-ap-

- Each member 9 or older must show their Amenity Card and have the 2025 release of liability sticker at the pool gate.
- Ice chests, coolers, and similar containers shall not be brought into the pool area. However, they can be left outside the gate. (8VSA Rule 1103)
- Bringing alcoholic beverages into the pool area is prohibited.
- . NO SMOKING IN THE POOL AREA: THIS INCLUDES VAPING.
- NO running, horseplay, or roughhousing in the pool area is allowed.
- NO flips, twists, or jumping backward into the pool is allowed.
- NQ squirt guns, water balloons, hard balls, rafts, recreational type flotation devices, diving into the shallow end, sitting on shoulders, climbing on rocks, or running in the pool area.
- NO vulgar or profane language in the pool area.
- A responsible adult must accompany children 13 and under, if they are 14 or older, please bring your children to the gate to ensure they are admitted. (BVSA Rule 1102c).
- A maximum pool capacity of 93 in water will be in effect, with a deck capacity of 150.
- Guests will be charged a \$5 guest fee per day AND MUST BE ACCOMPANIED BY A PROPERTY OWNER. There is a limit of 3 guests per Track/Lot 13 years old and older. There is a limit of 3 guests per Track/Lot 12 and under. Children 5-12 are \$3; children 4 and under are free. Amenity Passes (without the resident) will NOT be honored.
- All swimmers may be required to prove their ability to swim.
 Lifeguards may administer a swim test at any time to anyone under the age of 10.
- Property Owners must be in good standing to enter the pool area.
 Heath Breaks, which consists of a 10-minute rest period for children 13 and under,
 requires that they are completely out of the water. This includes the boby pool. These will be enforced every hour on the hour, and only potrons 14 and up can swim during these 10 minutes. These breaks may be more frequent if capacity is reached.



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

ARTICLE 16 PARKING AND STORAGE OF RECREATIONAL VEHICLES

(Adopted 7/9/88)

SECTION 1600. **DEFINITIONS**

As used in this Article, the term "Recreational Vehicle" includes, but is not limited to. Class A, B and C motorhomes, campers, camper shells, horse trailers*, cargo trailers, utility trailers, 5th wheels, recreational trailers and car haulers. Also included are dune buggies, and watercraft, which includes, but is not limited to, boats, jet skis and associated trailers. (Amended 10/21/06; 4/10/11; 10/20/14)

*Horse trailers are exempt from compliance during periods of high fire danger. During the rest of the year they will be expected to comply with the rules. (Added 10/20/14)

SECTION 1601. **UNIMPROVED LOTS**

- No recreational vehicle may be stored or parked indefinitely on any unimproved lot, except that a camper shell, motor home, trailer, up to 32 feet in overall length may be approved by the Environmental Control Committee for use as a construction facility.
- Except as provided in Sections 504(e)(10) and 604, no recreational vehicles may be stored on the common areas. (Added 8/19/00; Amended 10/20/14)

SECTION 1602. **SCREENING OF**

RECREATIONAL **VEHICLES NOT PARKED** OR STORED WITHIN APPROVED STRUCTURES

- **Recreational Vehicles** parked on any lot, not within an approved structure, within BVS will require an **ECC RV/Trailer placement** and screening form to be submitted and approved by the ECC.
- (a) (b) A recreational vehicle as defined in section 1600 must be parked or stored in the least conspicuous location on the Member's lot which may be reviewed/changed by the ECC Committee, subject to the approval of the ECC. Lots of one acre or more may park or store up to three (3) "Recreational Vehicles" as defined in Section 1600 in any combination but may not have more than one (1) of any of the same type of recreational vehicle. Lots of less than one acre may park or store no more than two (2) "Recreational Vehicles" as defined in Section 1600 but may not have two (2) of the same type of recreational vehicle. (Amended 3-10-08; Amended 2-10-09; Amended 10/20/14; Amended 06/10/18) (b) (c) The ECC may require additional screening, when reasonable and appropriate. to further limit visibility from adjoining lots, roads or common areas. This additional screening may include, but is not limited to, one or more of the following:
- Evergreen vegetation (1) with a minimum height of 6 feet when installed, that is expected to grow to shield eighty percent (80%) of the vehicle within three (3) years or less, with properly maintained irrigation to ensure sustained growth. In drought years consideration will be given to vegetation growth with respect to the 80% requirement.
- (2) Constructed screens that

- meet ECC requirements. Members who are in compliance and contemplate substantial changes that are inconsistent with compliance, or if the ECC determines that Members are no longer in compliance due to significant changes, those Members will be required to relocate the recreational vehicle to a new, least conspicuous location on their property. (Amended and renumbered 03/10/16)
- The temporary parking of a Member's recreational vehicles on their improved lot for loading and/ or unloading purposes shall not exceed 72 hours. (Added 3/10/08: Amended 2-10-09: Renumbered 03/10/16) (Added 10/21/06: 3/10/08: Amended 2/10/09; Amended, Removed (2), and Renumbered 10/20/14: Removed (c) and Amended & Renumbered (b) (3)&(4) 03/10/16
- (d) Recreational vehicles may not be used for camping, as a residence, or as a rental unit. Members and guests may utilize the BVSA campgrounds according to Article 5 of the BVSA Rules and may camp on a temporary basis on lots of ten (10) acres or greater with prior ECC approval (see ECC Rules Section 111.A.). (Added 06/10/18)

SECTION 1603. **ADMINISTRATION**

Administration of this article is delegated to the Environmental Control Committee. (Amended 1/27/01)

SECTION 1604. **ENFORCEMENT**

This Article will be enforced as provided in Article 17 and Article 3. (Amended 12/10/13)

TEXT OF PROPOSED **CHANGES to ECC RULES** SECTION 201. **Secondary Residential Unit or Guesthouse/Accessory Dwelling Unit (ADU)/Junior**

Accessory Dwelling Unit (JADU)

No secondary residential unit or guesthouse may be constructed or otherwise established unless it complies with all the following standards: [Kern Co. Ord. 19.901

Α. An Accessory Dwelling Unit must include complete independent living facilities for one or more persons including facilities and permanent provision for living, sleeping, eating, cooking, and sanitation, as well as a separate entrance. A detached ADU is separated from the primary structure. It may be converted space in an existing accessory structure that is converted into an independent living unit. A JADU is a complete independent unit attached to the primary residence with all of the above independent living facilities. (Added and Restated 12/01/2021)

Guesthouse.

One (1) accessory dwelling unit (ADU) and one (1) Junior Accessory Dwelling Unit (JADU) may be constructed or otherwise established on a legal residential lot. (restated 12/01/2021)

Floor Area.

The total floor area not to exceed the following:

Accessory Dwelling Unit-50% of primary residence or May not exceed 1200 square feet whichever is greater.

Junior Accessory Dwelling Unit- up to 50% of primary residence floor area (minimum of 800 square feet)

May not exceed 800 square feet. (restated 12/01/2021)

yellower the light, the less it pollutes the night sky. Warmer light is prettier, represents our homesbetter, and is more in character with our rural surroundings.

- 3. Do an inventory of our exterior lights by walking our property lines. If you can see the bulb, filaments, or LEDs of the light fixtures, they need to be aimed down and/or shielded so that they do not trespass on our neighbors. For motion sensor floodlights, make sure to trigger them and verify that they do not trespass on our neighbors too. Also, adjust the timer on motion sensor lights so that they stay on only as long as they are needed.
- 4. When your exterior light fails, consider replacing it with a dark sky approved Luminaire (https://darksky.org/what-we-do/darksky-approved/luminaires/#!/Home-De-pot/c/19294005), which is functional, beautiful, and will

improve our skies. When an exterior light bulb burns out, consider replacing it with a warmer colored light bulb. 2400k or less is best. The warm rich color will not only improve the appearance of your home, but it will also improve the night sky for everyone.

5. Home Depot sells an inexpensive smartlight switch (https://www.homedepot. com/p/Commercial-Electric-15-Amp-Single-Pole-White-Smart-Light-Switch-with-Wi-Fi-and-Bluetooth-Technology-Powered-by-Hubspace-1-Pack-HPSA11CWB/32031368-2) that can be programmed to turn on at dusk and off when desired. There is a phone app that allows control from anywhere. This makes it quite simple to have the light on when we need it and have it off when we don't.

If we all work together, we will continue to make our beautiful home even better.

proved life jacket—especially at the lake. Inflatable toys and floaties are not life-saving devices.

At Four Island Lake, water shoes can help protect your feet from sharp rocks or unexpected underwater debris. If enjoying the lake from a floating vessel remember Children under the age of 13 are required to wear a U.S. Coast Guard-approved life jacket.

Build Water Confidence

Swimming is a vital life skill. Contact the Whiting Center to enroll your children in swimming lessons and consider taking a refresher course yourself. Knowing how to float, tread water, and stay calm can make all the difference in an emergency. Learning CPR is another valuable skill, especially if you spend a lot of time around water.

Be Weather-Wise

The weather can change

quickly in Bear Valley.

If you hear thunder or see lightning, get out of the water immediately and seek shelter. Even at the pool, don't take chances when storms roll in.

Stay Sun-Safe and Hydrated

Sun protection is just as important as water safety. Apply waterproof sunscreen regularly, wear hats or rash guards, and drink plenty of water—especially on hot days. Even when you're in the



From helping homeless people to helping homeless dogs of Kern County

How does a dog end up for adoption? Many of us have dogs we received from rescues, like Have a Heart, or Marley's Mutts in Tehachapi, or one of the Kern County shelters. But what went into getting that puppy or precious dog into our homes? That story will unfold on May 13 at the Tailwaggers meeting as Mathew Buck, the Director of the City of Bakersfield Animal Care Center, talks about what it takes to run and work at an Animal Shelter. He will enlighten us with information as to how these family members ended up being in our homes.

I am thrilled to introduce you to the Director of the City of Bakersfield Animal Care Center, Mathew Buck.

He was born and raised in a small town in Georgia. From

an early age, he realized he had a passion for helping God's creation that could not take care of themselves. This journey led him to Lancaster, CA to intern at a homeless shelter while pursuing his BA in Missions and Urban Ministry. In just a couple short years, he was offered the Director position at the homeless shelter he was working at after my internship was over. He graciously accepted and continued learning the necessary skills it takes to run a nonprofit homeless shelter. Over the next several years he witnessed 100's of lives being transformed! All his studies and hard work was paying off! Unfortunately funding for the homeless shelter was cut. He then transitioned to become the Director of Operations for the same nonprofit that ran the homeless shelter. They ran two low-cost thrift stores, a soup kitchen that served hot meals to the community three nights a week and the largest food bank in the Antelope Valley. During this time, he met his wife and they moved to Tehachapi. The commute to Lancaster was taking its toll on him so he began looking for work closer to Tehachapi. That's when he was offered the Director position at the City of Bakersfield Animal Care Center. Although he did not have any experience working with animals, he did



have experience sheltering humans and always had a heart for animals. He had rescued many dogs before entering the field. The skills transferred fairly easily and we were able to save over 4,600 dogs in 2023, the largest amount in the history of CBACC in my first full year! With continued support we hope to end the euthanasia of adoptable dogs and achieve our ultimate goal of becoming no-kill."

Mathew will catch us up on what has happened at the shelter since 2023. Tailwaggers invites all members and friends of Tailwaggers to Mathew's presentation on Tuesday, May 13, in the Equestrian Center Lounge at 6 p.m. for refreshments and 6:30 p.m. for the meeting.
