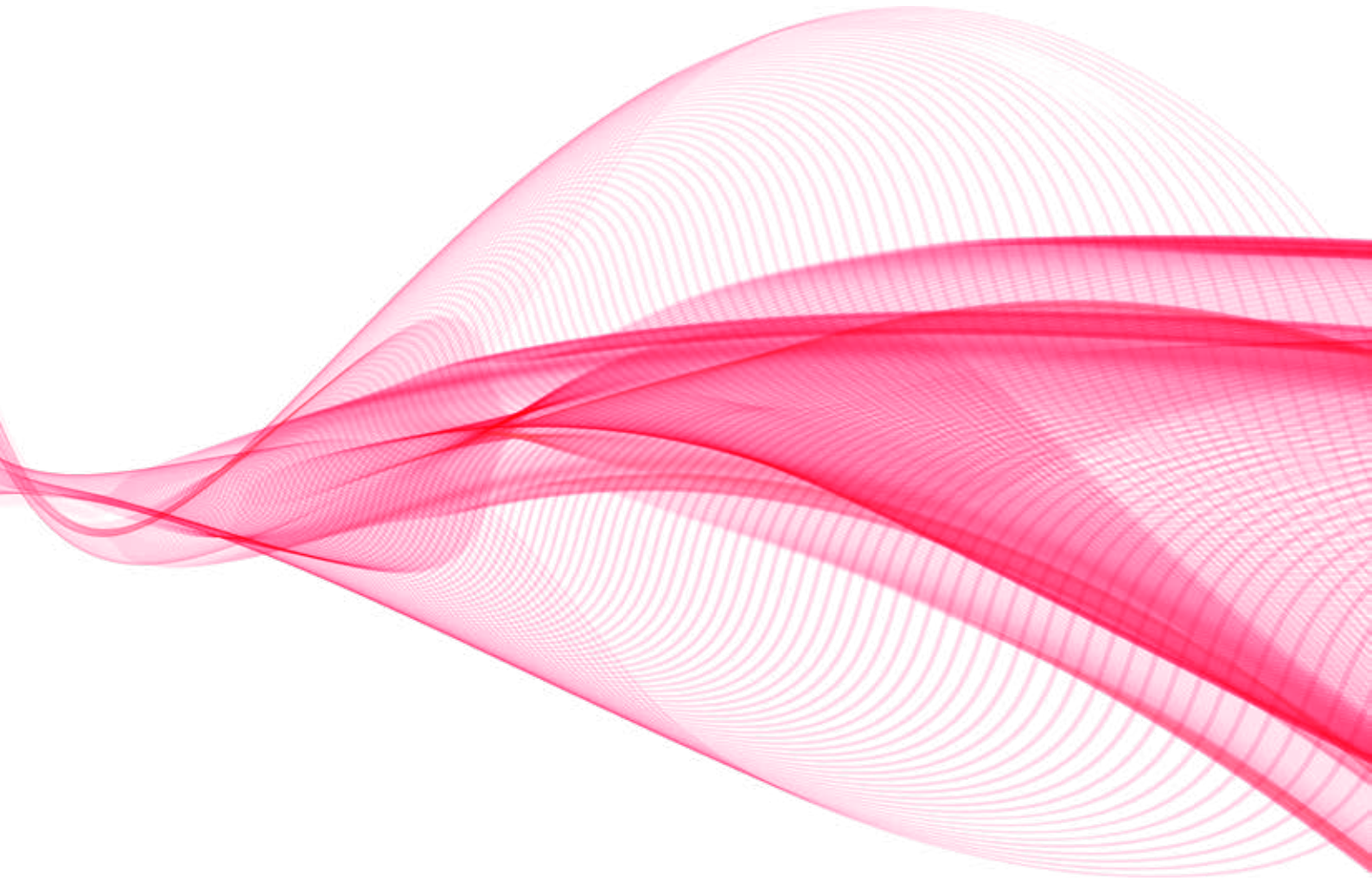

## **CODE OF ETHICAL CONDUCT**

The following standards of ethical conduct are derived from the application of right reasons to the Clinical Perfusion Scientist and are intended to aid a Clinical Perfusion Scientist in the maintenance of a high level of professional and personal ethics.

The Clinical Perfusion Scientist should strive to improve medical knowledge and skill on a continuous basis; offer the best team support to the patient, the doctor and the institution, and respect the patient's right of privacy, dignity and safety. The Clinical Perfusion Scientist should develop habits of economy, as they apply to time as well as the care and preparation of equipment and supplies; understand the value of keeping accurate records and making accurate reports; understand the legal responsibility as well as the scientific and human responsibilities of each member of the team to the patient and himself; understand all types of emergencies, both medical and mechanical, and the measure they must apply to solve the problem at hand, and/or the prevention of such emergencies, and be sufficiently schooled and skilled to act instead of react in time of emergency and/or stress.

The Clinical Perfusion Scientist should encourage participation in all activities with the ultimate goal of the improvement of the health and wellbeing of the individual as well as the community as a whole.

Clinical Perfusion Scientists should strive to publicly uphold the image, goals and ideals of the Society, for the advancement of technology and greater public understanding and awareness of the role in health and science.
