### Driving the electric vehicle charge

#### Did you know that we have been adding to our very own fleet of Hybrid Electric Vehicles (HEVs) since 2019?

That's right! We're committed to reducing our emissions across East Gippsland and this is just one of the things we're doing to get results.

Councillors Mendy Urie, Tom Crook, Jane Greacen and Mayor Mark Reeves have taken the lead in the uptake of hybrid vehicles and promotion of zero emissions transportation in the region. We also have a number of hybrid vehicles in the corporate fleet.

And in a shire as expansive as ours, it couldn't be more important that Councillors and staff are the driving force behind East Gippsland's commitment to renewable energy alternatives, starting with their use of hybrid electric vehicles.

Councillor Tom Crook said the advantages of embracing the HEV revolution are boundless.

"It's about being part of the solution," Cr Crook said.

"There's currently a global transformation in transport electrification occurring and us having electric vehicles allows us to be a part of that transformation to reduce emissions, to reduce the impacts of climate change and severe weather events like bushfires and floods that we are increasingly experiencing."

Cr Mendy Urie drives her own full electric vehicle. So, how long has she been driving her electric vehicle around the region and what does she love about it?

"What's not to love?" Cr Urie questioned.

"We can help significantly reduce our municipal emissions by investing zero-emissions vehicles and by filling up with 100% renewable energy. It's clean, and it's fun!" What else?

Our Sustainability Unit has been busy advocating to all levels of government for funding to put in public electric vehicle charging stations across the shire, for the benefit of the whole community. And guess what...success!

We have secured federal and state government funding to install seven fast chargers by June next year. Stage one is funded by the Australian Government's Local Roads and Community Infrastructure (LRCI) Program and will see 50kw fast chargers installed in Bairnsdale, Omeo, Orbost and Cann River by the end of June 2022.

We'll continue to advocate for opportunities that encourage a wider interest in electric vehicle uptake throughout East Gippsland communities, so watch this space!

### **Red Meat Conference shares vision for future**

The chance to share a vision for the future of agriculture in Gippsland brought together more than 250 farmers and agriculture industry representatives to hear from presenters speaking about the critical issues facing the region, with a general theme of Recovery and Resilience.

We partnered with Gippsland Agriculture Group to bring the 2022 Gippsland Red Meat Conference to the Riviera Convention Centre in Bairnsdale on 15 February after three postponements due to COVID-19.

Gippsland Agriculture Group led the event with farmer, conservationist and event manager Craig Bush coordinating the event.

Topics covered included how to bounce back after bushfire; achieving carbon neutrality; stock handling; precision lambing; soil biology and how to pass a farm from one generation to the next without tears.

The day ended with an address from Darren Anderson, producer of Network 10 cooking show Farm

to Fork, a show that highlights the produce this country has to offer. Agriculture is a key driver of economic activity in East Gippsland and one of the largest providers of jobs across the shire. We support the industry through a variety of events and programs including:

Two of the guests at the conference were Troy and Nette Fischer, who run a seedstock and grain business in Wasleys, South Australia.

In November 2015, a 85,000-hectare bushfire ravaged Troy, Nette and their family. The entire farm was destroyed, including fences, infrastructure and machinery. Despite major obstacles, they rebuilt their flock and farm, and in the last six years their business has tripled in size.

The Fischers' presentation covered steps any business can take to prepare for unexpected challenges and remain resilient even in the most difficult of times.

### Ag committee explores Orbost



The diverse nature of agriculture in Orbost was the focus of a visit to the town by our Agriculture Sector Advisory Committee on Thursday 24 February.

Mayor Cr Mark Reeves and Stuart McConnell and Sharon Raguse from our Place and Community team joined a diverse group of famers and farming experts for the field trip and anoverview of the Future of Orbost & District Project.

John, Jenny and Gareth Di Cecco hosted the group at their protea farm at Corringle. They talked about strong demand for their products from Melbourne and the South Coast and their desire to invest in water infrastructure to prepare for future dry seasons.

The next stop was in Gargans Lane where an overview of the Snowy River Seeds R&D program was discussed. Damien Courtier and Lachie Ritchie provided an overview of the intensive seed corn research and innovation program and their support for the proposed seeds institute facility to be established in Orbost.

Last stop was the Marlo Road dairy of Alistair Steele, where his robotic milking facility was the star of the show with Alistair discussing how his herd has adapted to the robotic milkers, and the data and analysis role that Alistair now plays in making his farm as productive as possible.

The three different approaches to farming presented – including some industry-leading scientific and technical approaches – offered ways to make farming more profitable and efficient and sparked a lot of discussion and interest from attendees.

### Outreach events a success

Community Outreach Events hosted by the National Recovery and Resilience Agency and Rotary Australia were held across East Gippsland in February to offer support and advice on drought, bushfire, flood and more.

We were represented at all four events by our Agribusiness Development Officer, Emergency Management staff and place managers, connecting with the farming communities and providing a face for Council and relevant information to farmers.

The events brought together government, charities, notfor-profits and agricultural organisations to present a range of supports available for drought recovery and other challenges. Rural communities came together to grab a bite, catch up with friends and see what was on offer – including \$500 debit cards provided by Rotary Australia to those suffering financial hardship because of the drought Most visitors checked out at least five of the 17 services represented and received one-on-one wellbeing support. Many of the farmers and other community members who visited the events said they had stayed far longer than planned.

We are now advocating for another series of outreach events.

## Advocacy delivers community results

We've been busy advocating to our state and federal counterparts on a range of opportunities and projects to ensure our region is a desirable place to live, work, play and invest.

We actively engage with our communities to understand needs and aspirations, so we can create and maintain a healthy, connected and sustainable region.

This helps us prioritise the key issues impacting East Gippsland and advocate accordingly.

It was recently announced that our region received \$28 million in grants for 38 separate projects as part of the Federal Government's Black Summer Bushfire Recovery Grants program. This included eight applications that were directly lodged by us and many more that we played an integral part in, working closely with community groups to develop their funding applications.

### Bairnsdale Airport's ageing water mains are being replaced.

This project was identified as a priority project in the Bairnsdale Airport Masterplan.

The infrastructure was installed in the time of World War II and has now reached its end of life.

There will be minimal disruption to airside aviation traffic. The project is expected to be completed

before this April's East Gippsland Field Days, which are held at the aerodrome.

The water main upgrade will complement a range of projects that will enable the facility to attract a wider range of aircraft.

In 2018, Bairnsdale Airport was awarded 'National Small Regional Aerodrome of the Year' by the Australian Airports Association.

We also operate airports in Orbost and Mallacoota.

### Work begins on 'Coota footpath

Another capital works project has begun in Mallacoota, this time to improve pedestrian safety.

We are constructing a footpath along Mirrabook Road, starting at the Lakeside Drive intersection and running 450 metres to the corner near Raheen Drive.

The \$582,000 project also includes a pedestrian island which allows people to cross one lane of Lakeside Drive and wait or rest before crossing the other lane.

Drainage infrastructure at the intersection of Mirrabooka Road and Lakeside Drive will also be improved.

This work will be completed by the end of May. In June, we round out the project with a guardrail along an 80-metre section of road shoulder.

### Omeo Caravan Park to re-open in April

Work is progressing to have the Omeo Caravan reopened in time for Easter.

A flood in early January caused welldocumented damage to the park and amenities, local roads and other public facilities such as Livingstone Park and the pump track.

We are placing a high priority on remedial works, reopening the park and providing free interim camping to support the business community and visitor economy in the Omeo Region.

It is likely to take up until Easter for flood remedial works to be completed at the Omeo Caravan Park, after which time the park will reopen.

The current lease for the park ends on 31 March and we are in the process of appointing a caretaker manager to commence as soon as possible from 1 April.

Until a caretaker is in place, the Omeo Service Centre is taking enquiries in early April, regarding future bookings. existing and Please call 5153 9500.

#### **Existing bookings:**

- Where provided with confirmation of bookings Council will update the booking register.
- Anyone cancelling a booking will be noted, but refunds will be the responsibility of the current tenant until March 31, 2022. After that date more information will be made available.

#### **New bookings:**

- The Omeo Service Centre is only taking bookings for Easter (Friday 15 April) onwards.
- Tentative bookings can made for 1-14 April but will be dependent on the park re-opening prior to Easter.

With the Omeo dump point currently unavailable, the nearest public dump points are at Dinner Plain car park and Bruthen Caravan Park.

With the support of the Omeo Reserve Committee Recreation of Management, free camping is available at the Omeo Recreation Reserve until the caravan park reopens. Due to other event bookings at the reserve, free camping is not available on 15-17 April.

### Council meeting in brief

Council made the following decisions at the February 22 Council meeting:

- To write to the Victorian Minister for Roads and Road Safety asking for an urgent review of the funding model for school crossing supervisors and requesting an alternate operating model. Council is concerned over the increasing use of ratepayer funds to supervise and maintain school crossings given that education is a state government responsibility.
- Awarded a contract for the third construction package for the WORLD Sporting Precinct, Bairnsdale. The contract, worth \$3,589,286, was awarded to Allmore Constructions for construction of the new WORLD pavilion, services infrastructure and connections, and the non-living elements of the landscape design.
- Noted a quarterly update on the progress of Council's capital works and major projects.
- Adopted an updated policy for private jetties in the Paynesville canals. The policy outlines the acceptable form for jetties in the canals and removes the application fee, replacing it with a planning permit application fee, in line with Council's process for other
- Endorsed two submissions: one to the Municipal Association of Victoria's Rules Review and the other to the Central and Gippsland Region Sustainable Water Strategy.
- Agreed to surrender to Bairnsdale Cemetery to the Crown. During an audit of Council-owned properties, it was discovered the cemetery was in Council's name, which is unusual.

## 6 tips for a seamless road trip this Easter

Here are some tips from our road safety crew to help you avoid any bumps in the road and arrive in one piece at your Easter break destination this year.

1. Leave yourself plenty of time to get there
The Easter holiday break will result in extra traffic
on our region's roads as people head away for
the extra-long weekend.
Prioritise safety over swiftness. It doesn't matter

Prioritise safety over swiftness. It doesn't matter when you arrive, just make sure it's alive!

2. Make sure your car is ready to hit the road Checked your tyres lately? Before you hit the road, check your tyres' tread depth meets the minimum legal tread depth, which is 1.5mm in Victoria. While you're at it, check your oil levels, radiator coolant, wiper fluid and of course, fuel.

**3. Take a break, enjoy the scenery**Plan your rest stops. There are some magical spots around in East Gippsland for you to stop,

spots around in East Gippsland for you to stop, take a break and enjoy the region's hospitality while you're at it. Plan to stop every two hours and don't drive for more than 10 hours a day.

#### 4. Read the road ahead

Be roadwise! Constantly search the road ahead for changing conditions, look out for hazards and pay attention to road markings and signage signalling a change on the road ahead. Get real-time traffic information by regularly checking the VicRoads website.

#### 5. Watch out for wildlife

Don't forget our fauna friends when driving around the region this Easter. Here in East Gippsland, we're lucky enough to live alongside some of Australia's most amazing native animals and birdlife, so please be on the lookout for any unexpected crossings.

#### 6. Revive for the drive home

A lot of accidents occur because of driver fatigue, particularly after an action-packed holiday. Victoria State Emergency Service (VICSES) volunteers and Lions Club members operate Driver Reviver sites around the state on holiday weekends and peak traffic days offering motorists a safe place to stop, refresh and have a free cuppa.

### Lorraine hangs up her stop sign

Bairnsdale 754 Primary School is about to say farewell to its much-loved school crossing supervisor, Lorraine Warford has hung up her stop sign after 25 years of looking after young students.

Since 1997, Mrs Warford could be seen every morning from 8am at the Nicholson Street crossing, stop sign in hand, whistle at the ready and a smile on her face.

Mrs Warford worked her initial 754 Primary stints on Main Street.

"On day one I was nervous. On day two I was nervous – the boss even told me I couldn't hide behind the stop bat!" Mrs Warford said.

Back then, Main Street had no traffic lights, so getting children across the road safely was an even bigger responsibility.

"One morning, the hair on the back of my neck stood up. I could sense something was wrong. I turned and saw a dear old lady driving down the road the wrong way towards us," Mrs Warford recalled.

Mrs Warford sprang into action to prevent an accident, stopping the children on the roadside and getting the wayward elderly motorist to turn around.

"The drivers are not always so great," she said. "But I'm thankful to the kids

for always behaving and following the rules. There's no riding bikes, there's no riding scooters, there's no bouncing balls and they have to keep their feet behind the yellow line, because if they don't, I can't blow the whistle."

Layla, 8, from Bairnsdale walks across with her bicycle every morning and always stops to say hello to Mrs Warford.

"She remembers my name every morning and she's nice," Layla said. Mrs Warford said getting to know the children had been the highlight of her work and she has learnt every child's name every year.

"It was a mission of mine to learn every child's name. And I'm Lorraine to them, not Mrs Warford. That brings me to their level.

"By coming down to their level you earn more respect – and respect is earned not dished out – and that way we all get on really well.

In the 25 years of working at the school, Mrs Warford has seen generations of children, in fact, some of the children that she once used to help cross are now parents themselves. "It was a shock when I first recognised one mum as a kid I used to help cross at Main Street a long time ago. I looked and I couldn't believe that that much time had passed. But it had. The kids I've looked after have been

great and I'm lucky to have seen them turn into fantastic adults."

Mrs Warford is employed by Council as one of our 22 crossing supervisors and is our longest-serving supervisor of all time.

In her 25 years with Council, Mrs Warford received no complaints and was never faulted in her work. Of the more than 3,000 crossing supervisors stationed across Victoria, Mrs Warford earned a nomination for Victorian School Crossing Supervisor of the Year in 2014 and she has been recognized by her school for her service.

A Bairnsdale resident for 53 years, Mrs Warford said she can remember the days when people still rode horses in town and children came to school on bicycles. Nowadays, she noted that the roads are mainly used by fourwheel drives, which makes the road safety role crossing supervisors play more crucial.

Mrs Warford admitted there is one thing she will not miss about working at the crossing – the cold, wet and foggy winter months.

"My hands freeze in the winter. One day we had hail – and that wasn't very pleasant, being pelted, especially as we can't have umbrellas. I wear layers and gloves and hand warmers and toe warmers, but afterwards I still sit in the car with the heater going."

## Sea to Summit nature walk a step closer

The proposed Sea to Summit trail walk from Cape Conran Coastal Park to Errinundra National Park in East Gippsland is a step closer, with the multi-day walking route getting a big thumbs up from stakeholders and community.

State government market research included a review of the walker market, focus groups, a national survey of walkers and an assessment of various walking concepts. It backed creation of the approximately 60km path, equipped with four huts.

The next steps will see Great Victorian Outdoor (DELWP) ask consultants to develop a Feasibility Study and Concept Design process, which will include stakeholder engagement workshops in Orbost.

### Community hall resilience improvements

We are pleased to announce that we have completed the following works relating to the Community Resilience and Development Program:

- Bushfire Attack Level assessments (BAL) on all halls
- supply and installation of audiovisual equipment
- Electrical switchboard upgrades and installation of transfer switches in halls, where required, and ember proofing works are progressing.

We have also collaborated with the Department of Jobs Precincts and Roads and NBN on the completion of 37 Strengthening Telecommunications Against Natural Disasters (STAND) satellite communication systems on community facilities, complementing the existing eight systems currently installed in the shire.

### Social recovery reset

Two years on from the 2019-20 Black Summer Bushfires, many agencies and recovery partners are continuing to provide social recovery support for the communities affected by the bushfires.

We are supporting the Social Recovery Working Group to assess the current and anticipated needs and delivery of social recovery and wellbeing support across East Gippsland.

The assessment will be undertaken by:

- Survey to social recovery providers
- Focus groups discussions with networks of social/wellbeing providers
- Interviews with each Community Recovery Committee

The data and findings will be combined into an assessment report with recommendations. This assessment is designed to establish a stronger, evidence-based understanding of the social wellbeing recovery needs and capacities of communities and the agencies servicing them.

The findings of the assessment will help inform social/wellbeing recovery planning processes and work across 2022 and be integrated into longer term strategic plans.

The results will be provided to the Social Recovery Working Group, member/representatives and shared with the Community Recovery Committees.

### Council meeting in brief

Council made the following decisions at the Council meeting on 15 March:

- Heard from the Sarsfield Community Association regarding its issue with an application for a National Recovery and Resilience Agency bushfire recovery grant.
- Resolved to issue a Notice of Decision to grant a planning permit for a multi-lot subdivision at 27 Eagle Point Road, Eagle Point. The land is zoned residential and will have 75 lots.
- Heard from a number of residents during Public Question Time regarding Victorian Government vaccination requirements.
- Endorsed notices of motion to take to the Australian Local Government Association's National General Assembly in June. Council's two motions concern implementing fairer processes for Disaster Relief Fund Arrangements, and continuing the Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program, or a similar noncompetitive program.
- Supported a Notice of Motion from Cr Mendy Urie to light the Corporate Centre building in blue and yellow to show support for the Ukrainian people.

### **Emergency preparedness**


We work with communities to help them prepare for emergencies. This 'grass roots' approach ensures emergency planning is supported by local knowledge and community strengths.
