

# Gold for Gippsland

Gippsland has achieved astounding success at the Qantas Australian Tourism Awards, the tourism industry's peak awards event. Destination Gippsland and Wilsons Promontory Cruises winning three gold medals between them at the awards held on the Sunshine Coast on 18 March.

Destination Gippsland, the regional tourism board and the peak tourism organisation for eastern Victoria, scooped gold in the Tourism Marketing & Campaigns category for its outstanding work, including its market-leading All Kinds of Wonder brand.

# Council commits funding to get Buchan moving

We're getting the ball rolling on the much-needed upgrade of the Buchan Recreation Reserve.

Deputy Mayor Cr Arthur Allen travelled to Buchan to announce Council's \$1.2 million contribution to upgrade the reserve following community's unsuccessful application for a National Recovery Resilience Agency and Summer Grants.

The \$1.2m will come from a Federal Government Local Roads Community Infrastructure Program grant. Allocating the funding to Buchan spoke to the high priority of the project, including the importance of providing a new pavilion, tennis/ netball courts and other facilities.

The redevelopment is one of the recovery priorities identified by the Buchan community through its Community Recovery Committee.

Buchan, Gelantipy and Districts Association Chairperson Renewal said Kate Hodge Council's \$1.2m contribution was a "great announcement".

"It's only the first instalment and now we need our state and federal governments to come to the party and be senior partners. Council's funding gives us great impetus to get moving on the much-needed rebuilding. The challenge now is to find the remaining funding to get it over the line," Ms Hodge said.

"Our reserve is a multi-use facility, is used daily and has five user groups year-round. It is very much the pulse and lifeblood of our community.

"We were heavily impacted - flame affected, by the fires. We lost homes and lives and the rec reserve played a role housing the displaced as a refuge centre. If we had a fire like we had again, it will come into play again," Ms Hodge said.

Federal Member for Gippsland Chester on 14 April announced an additional \$3 million for the project.

## Council meeting in brief

Council had intended to hold its scheduled Tuesday 5 April meeting in Buchan. However, due to poor weather and flooding, Council instead held an unscheduled meeting at 6pm the same day at the Corporate Centre, Bairnsdale. Council made the following decisions at the meeting:

- To write to the Victorian Premier, as a member of the Rail Freight Alliance (RFA), in support of the RFA's advocacy in calling on the State Government to support the completion of the Murray Basin Rail Project as originally scoped, ahead of the Victorian election, and call for the network to remain in state ownership and control.
- To waive rates on the approximately 150 properties that have not yet been rebuilt following the 2019-20 Black Summer bushfires, with this waiver extending for up to three years.
- To launch the Youth Ambassador committee and back a related action plan and terms of reference.
- Appointed community representatives to a Disability Advisory Committee tasked with creating a more inclusive and accessible East Gippsland by providing a voice for people with disability.
- Permitted approval for the extension of the leased area of the Riviera Nautic marina facility at Chinaman's Creek to allow for new building and works to extend existing jetties.
- Grant permission to create six lots in a low-density residential zoned area on Meridian Way, Newlands Arm.
- Endorsed a statutory process to vary the South Bairnsdale Industrial Estate Special Charge Scheme.

# Propagating for the future

A lot of forethought goes into planning a successful garden. From picking plants and trees that are suited to the environment to understanding your garden aspects, sketching out a landscape that is sure to flourish with minimal upkeep and financial outlay can be an incredibly involved process.

Even during the winter months, when the ground temperature cools and growing conditions slow down, our parks and gardens crews are still hard at work managing, planning, propagating and cultivating the shire's green assets, making sure they thrive all year round.

This time of the year is the perfect time to assess how our gardens are going, particularly after the extreme seasons we've experienced over the past few years. Although the last six months have been predominantly wet, we're looking into the future and considering what plants will be well suited to hotter and drier conditions.

#### It's cutting time

During the winter period, the crew will be taking lots of cuttings to use in the upgrades of our garden beds. The new streetscape in Bailey Street, Bairnsdale will have a wonderful tree planted that is *Quercus ilex* or the Holy Oak which is native to the Mediterranean region and evergreen. It can withstand harsh dry conditions because of exposure to asphalt road surfaces. The same

will happen on the Esplanade in Lakes Entrance. The plants will be smaller as not only will they face heat from the road, but exposure to strong southerly winds straight off the lake and ocean.

The Esplanade has been planted out with Banksia 'Sentinel' which hasn't been used previously. It grows to approximately four metres but remains thin so is perfect to grow along promenades and avenues, especially in coastal areas. One plant we have been trialing in public areas is the Miscanthus grass, which originates from Africa and eastern Asia.

#### **Experience matters**

Our crews often bring in cuttings of their own to propagate and potentially use amongst our assets. With the assistance of our new trainees, the nursery will be brimming with stock going into the next growth period. For home gardeners, saving your own seed, taking cuttings, or dividing clumps of plants by the roots are the most common ways to propagate.

#### Tips to grow your own

Here are some tips from our inhouse experts about growing your own plants for free!

- Timing is everything A good gardening book will help you to understand the best time of the year to take your cuttings. The same applies to germinating seeds.
- Climate control Plants have their optimal temperatures for seed germination or striking roots from cuttings. Greenhouses or heated beds are good for controlling the environment. Try a few at a time rather than all at once in case conditions are not ideal.
- 3. Quality, not quantity Ensure good airflow and that you're using good quality water administered in small amounts. E.g. Use a spray bottle at regular intervals.
- Good genes Always propagate from healthy plant material and use good quality seed raising or propagation mix.

In late March, Mayor Cr Mark Reeves and General Manager Assets and Environment Fiona Weigall joined fellow representatives of One Gippsland (the peak advocacy body for Gippsland) at Parliament House to discuss regional priorities for Gippsland. One Gippsland met with Harriet Shing MP and also hosted an Opposition Roundtable, consisting of local members and Shadow Ministers. Cr Reeves said an item that resonated with the group was the mental health and wellbeing of remote communities and the support required for organisations such as bush nursing centres and the Royal Flying Doctor Service – who often carry very heavy loads in our community. How we look after our communities - connectivity, communications, roads and supporting service providers across the region – is important.

#### **Council hears from Youth Ambassador**

Councillors recently had a presentation from Kiera, chair of the shire's Youth Ambassador program.

Kiera spoke about the Youth Ambassadors 2022-23 Action Plan, which was later adopted at the April 5 Council meeting.

Youth Ambassadors are a group of 12 to 25 year olds who advocate on the needs of young people.

# Cash splash for regional roads

Our advocacy efforts have paid off yet again, with \$2.9 million funding headed our way for local roads and infrastructure. This year's Federal Budget included an additional \$500 million for the continuation of the Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program. The details of the fund are yet to be released but we're confident we'll receive a healthy chunk of that for East Gippsland in the 2023-24 financial year.



## **Project updates**

- The pedestrian crossing and playground redevelopment at the Marlo Triangle Park are now complete.
- Flood water has slowed works on stage 2 of the Mallacoota Seawall, but the project is still on target for completion by the end of June.



# Let there be (LED) light!

Contractors from Magnetic Power Services have begun the big swap of 1,760 streetlights throughout East Gippsland to LED. This collaborative replacement program between East Gippsland, Gippsland South Wellington local governments, will see high energy streetlights replaced by LEDs on major and minor roads.



The Wairewa community came together with our bushfire recovery place managers, Emergency Management team and other partner agencies at a barbecue recently. A great opportunity for everyone to get together, have a chat in person and discuss future needs and expectations.



#### Roads and runways

With the warmer months almost behind us all our road resealing works have wrapped up.

A reminder to drive safely following major rain events and keep an eye out for signs in affected areas! Some recent heavy rainfall through parts of the shire has again put pressure on some of our drains.

Orbost Airport was transformed into a film set earlier this month for an Angel Flight promotional video shoot. Our Aerodrome Coordinator worked with Angel Flight crews and a couple of Marlo locals to film the video, highlighting the amazing work this charity does, and the role our airports play to support our communities.



# E-waste not, want not

East Gippsland residents made a huge contribution to the recycling and reusing of valuable materials in 2020 and 2021.

Data shows we recycled 86,301 kilograms of electronic waste (e-waste), bringing in our unwanted electronics to Bairnsdale, Bruthen, Lakes Entrance, Mallacoota, Omeo or Orbost.

#### Out in the field

Our Emergency Management team has been out and about lately, working with communities and local authority representatives to review outdated flood class levels.

What does this mean? East Gippsland's flood maps are linked to river gauges which provide a prediction of flood heights expected - minor, moderate

and major. These need updating to reflect changes to floodplains, infrastructure and levees. Why?

can take action based on the information being provided by authorities, who will be able to predict flood levels more accurately.

## Steps in the right direction

Pavement and sealing works for Bailey Street in Bairnsdale have been completed as have the traffic islands. Despite weather delays, all work is likely to wrap up by the end of May. The Mirrabooka Road footpath in Mallacoota is done, and Moroney Street in Bairnsdale is also progressing well, with kerb and channel works complete and road pavement works ongoing.



# Turning wood into wonders

The Australian Wood Design Exhibition, showcasing the work of local and national woodworkers, has opened at the Orbost **Exhibition Centre.** 

Mayor Cr Mark Reeves spoke at the opening on Saturday 26 March.

Five awards were handed out to artists for the impressive works on show, as judged by timber artist Stephen Hughes and East Gippsland Art Gallery Director Crystal Stubbs. The \$2000 first prize went to Bairnsdale's Trevor Herbstreit for his Scimitar Skeleton Clock, crafted from red gum.

The emphasis of the exhibition is to promote a sustainable timber industry and the exhibition only accepted entries that used at least 75 per cent Australian timber. Entries were not allowed to include rare or endangered timber species, except for recycled works.

The Australian Wood Design Exhibition is on at the Orbost Exhibition Centre, 8 Clarke Street, until Sunday 19 June. Opening hours are Thursday to Sunday from 11.00 am to 3.00 pm.

# **Omeo Mountain Bike Trail**
