

The Trojan Women Project began with an idea - what would happen if we shared the music, the words, the staging of our 1974 La MaMa's The Trojan Women with a new generation of artists in other countries where there is a history of conflict or ongoing conflict? Could we pass on the material in the same oral tradition as we had done within our own company, The Great Jones Rep, over the years and what would that look like? And someday, what if we could bring performers from each country together, these people who now share the same songs and story? It was our dream to bring them together in the same room. Now we celebrate six years of working in Guatemala, Cambodia and Kosovo with a company that includes nineteen artists from those countries, along with young artists from New York City who are learning the show for the first time, original members of the 1974 production, and second generation members from 1996-2004. We are honored and deeply touched by this intergenerational, international company who have come together for the The Trojan Women Project Festival. We are so happy you are also here to be a part of the celebration of this very special piece and this very special project.

Mia's Note:

Theatre has the unique power to allow an audience to see through the eyes of others, to understand different perspectives and encounter otherness. In this way, we foster transformations of thought — by understanding "the other" we can better understand ourselves. At this time in our history, there is an urgent need for American audiences to understand diverse viewpoints, to embrace our culture built of multiplicities. This production has a proven unique quality to transcend boundaries of language, culture, and Identity. For that reason **The Trojan Women Project** speaks to the very core of La MaMa's mission.

When La MaMa's Founder Ellen Stewart, Andrei Serban, and Elizabeth Swados began La MaMa's resident company, Great Jones Repertory Company (GJRC) in 1972, they did so in part to create a production of *Medea* in which a black woman could be portrayed as a tragic hero. Since those revolutionary beginnings, GJRC continues to embody the DNA of contemporary America. This singular American company is noted for subverting the classics by performing them with actors of all races and cultures in performance spaces ranging from proscenium theatres and ancient amphitheatres to makeshift stages in post-conflict zones. The steadfast commitment of being a "theatre for the world" that puts current issues, quite literally, at center stage, reflects our goal of presenting art at La MaMa that resounds with the humanity of its times.

Theatre is an ephemeral art form. The question I have with many of the productions we create and present at La MaMa is: how can a show have a lasting impact on an audience, community, and our world? The answer, I believe, is in the conversations that it creates and the art and action it inspires. This project seeks to do that not only through art but also through community action, panel discussions, and workshops — **The Trojan Women Project** is not just a theatre production but the start of a conversation about our future, one that invites all to participate.

What better way to celebrate Ellen Stewart's Centennial year!

Director's Note:

More than two thousand years ago Euripides wrote a play about the catastrophic consequences of shrewd cheating in the shape of the Trojan horse, that brought to ashes a highly developed civilization.

Today the play is just as vibrant, due, unfortunately, to the modern trojan horses, the cheaters, (today's politicians included) who have tried to destroy old cultural traditions and provoke havoc and death to entire communities.

Forty-five years ago, when we started this work on Greek tragedy, we toured extensively internationally, in many places of conflict. Performing back then in the ruins of Baalbeck in Lebanon, the tension between different political camps was high before the show, but the power of the ancient sounds echoing in the old ruins and the immediate impact of the play resonated so movingly that at the end the entire audience joined the company to share a glass of champagne and, at least for half an hour, we all felt the power theatre has sometimes to reconcile and relax the spirits.

Conflicts are still so present today, even if somehow different, and a great universal play like this is open to finding new meanings in relation to what happens at this moment in time.

A civilization is destroyed. The women fight, lament, bury their dead, and at the end embark onto the Grecian ships, ready for exile and a new era. These women hold something (the spirit) that the primitive uneducated soldiers can't take away. These women will bear the children and will inspire the creation of a new civilization.

Transmission and sharing, two words that connect history and theatre.

As for spirits, let us hope that Ellen and Liz, from above, share with us the wish to pass the torch to the new generation.

Note from Helen Nicoll:

In 2018 I travelled to Kosovo for the opening night of **The Trojan** Women Project. The performance took place outside, on the steps, and around the massive and highly stylized National Library of Kosovo. The building itself bared the scars and history of the Yugoslav Wars. The company was composed of performers and musicians who spoke Albanian, Serbian, and Romani whose families and neighborhoods might have fought each other in "The War". To watch these actors working side by side, learning the libretto (which was a made up language), sharing the space and becoming the characters of *The Trojan Women* gave me hope that we can connect and share and rejoice in our common humanity and these walls and barriers and blind ignorance that colors so much of our geopolitical discourse can be fought and overcome. Six years in the making, The Trojan Women Project and Festival is the culmination of the perseverance of Onni and her extraordinary creative team...Kim İma, Bill Ruyle, George Drance, Sara Galassini, and Maud Dinand. Artists from around the world have now gathered here at La MaMa to work with renowned director, Andrei Serbian to re-imagine this timeless *Trojan Women*.

Artists in Cambodia, Guatemala, and Kosovo learned the piece as it was historically taught – through oral tradition – and performed local productions in their own countries. The Trojan Women Project Festival unites Albanian, American, Cambodian, Guatemalan, Mayan, Roma, and Serbian artists to perform a new production of The Trojan Women.
