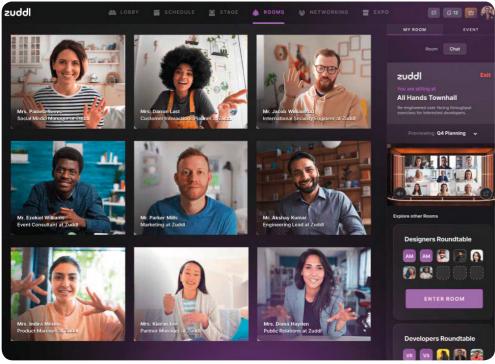
dents at any level, whether that is primary pupils, high school students or adult learners. There is now far more flexibility for students to customise their learning experience.
