Beef

Easy Broccoli Pasta

Ingredients

230g. uncooked spaghetti

340g broccoli florets with stems

1 tbsp. olive oil

1 tbsp. butter

3 garlic cloves

14 tsp. red pepper flakes or to taste

2 cups vegetable stock

½ tsp. salt or to taste

½ cup heavy cream

1 cup Parmesan



Instructions

- Cook the angel hair pasta according to the directions on the box.
 Drain and set aside.
- Take the broccoli and chop the florets off the stalk. Then, slice the stalks lengthwise into small sticks and finely dice them.
- In a large cooking pot, add the olive oil, butter, red pepper flake, and garlic. Stir the ingredients together as the butter melts, and then pour in the vegetable broth.
- Add the broccoli florets and stalks, and then the salt. Make sure the broccoli is fully submerged in the liquid. Cook on the stove top for 20 minutes, until it's tender.
- Add the cream, Parmesan cheese, and angel hair pasta. Stir everything together and then let it rest for 10 minutes.
- Using tongs, give the pasta another stir. Then, sprinkle Parmesan cheese on top. Serve immediately with another sprinkle of Parmesan.

I took this photo after a late night run to the servo to get some ice cream. I was inspired by the way the lights shone through the thick fog that was there that night.




Charli Maree Saywell, aged 14, Moon Lily Refelctions






The Inheritance Games

The first two books in the series are out and available online and in stores like Big W and Kmart. The third is set to be released in September. Amazon is currently developing a series based on the first book




