

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY REPORT

1.0. INTRODUCTION

Ministry of Education, Science and Technology (MoEST) through the Directorate of Inspection and Advisory Services (DIAS), with support from Local Government Accountability Program (LGAP) conducted inspection of primary schools in Ntchisi district. The inspection was part of the nationwide inspection that the ministry conducted in various districts. The inspection visits were carried out by a team of 12 inspectors drawn from various districts.

Ntchisi district has a total of 150 schools, 90,431 students of which 46,763 are boys and 43,668 are girls. here are 1,081 classrooms and 2,040 toilets. The district has 1,370 teachers (966 males and 404 females) of which 1283 are qualified. The district has 223,628 textbooks

2.0.PURPOSE OF INSPECTION

The purpose of inspection was to examine and evaluate teaching and learning alongside other matters that affect students' learning. The overall expectation is that schools and stakeholders will act upon the key recommendations contained in the inspection reports. In this way, students will benefit from improved provision of education leading to higher attainment and consequently be better able to serve both their own needs and those of the nation as a whole.

3.0 METHODOLOGY

The inspectors observed lessons, scrutinized students' exercise books, teaching and administrative records, inspected classrooms, pit latrines/toilets and surroundings. The team also conducted interviews with teachers, students and community members. The information contained in the Pre-Inspection Self- Assessment Documents (PISAD) completed by the schools and data from the national Education Management Information System were taken into account.

The inspection targeted the following National Education Standards (NES):

NES 1 – Learning in lessons

NES 2 - Students' outcomes in the curriculum

NES 3 - Attainment across the school

NES 5 - Students' behavior and involvement in school life

NES 10 - Well-planned lessons

NES 11 - Teaching for effective learning

NES 18 - School Leadership

Judgement was based on four levels of achievement which are: -

7.0 KEY STRENGTHS

- Availability of schemes of work in all schools
- Delegation of responsibilities by some school heads e.g. Champhoyo, Chamndulu and Chansembe
- Availability of administrative records e.g. Ndevu, Nyanga and Mtuwanjovu I

8.0 WEAKNESSES

- Inadequate and intermittent lesson planning in all schools
- Senior staff were not monitoring teachers' planning and curriculum coverage in some schools such as Kalira II, Bunda and Chambawala
- Unpunctuality by both teachers and learners in most schools except Kayoyo, Ndevu and Mtsiro
- High absenteeism by both teachers and learners in some schools

9.0 CRITICAL ISSUES NOT PART OF THE NES UNDER REVIEW

- Lack of safe water in some schools e.g. Mpheza and Chididi
- Lack of maintenance of infrastructure, for instance, leaking roofs especially those made of tiles e.g. Ndevu, Nyanga, Chididi Chambawala and Chinthembwe
- Inadequate teachers' houses in most schools e.g. Mtuwanjovu I, Ndevu, Kalira II and Chididi
- Illegal boarding at Kayoyo, Kalira II and Mtuwanjovu I
- Shortage of classrooms in some schools e.g. Muuta, Chansembe, Champhoyo and Chambawala

10.0 BEST PRACTICES

- Home grown school feeding program e.g. Mtuwanjovu I
- Clean toilets at Mtsiro Primary School
- High community participation at Chamndulu, Chansembe and Mtsiro Primary Schools

- Should encourage maintenance of schools' infrastructure
- Should abolish illegal boarding in schools

TO THE DEM

- Should ensure that inspection and supervisory visits are timely and adequately supported
- Should make follow-up visits to recommendations made by Inspectors
- Should encourage schools to maintain school infrastructures

TO THE SEST

- Should procure and supply text books to schools
- Should initiate procurement of new motorbikes for PEAs
- Should train and recruit more special needs teachers
- Shouldcontinue organising more inspection of schools
