- b. It is the word for unconditional affection; it is the purest form of love imaginable.

A Working Definition...

Today's 'Big Idea'...

Agape is not what God does; Agape is who God is.

A. Agape Under The Microscope...

"(Agape) Love is patient, (agape) love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. It does not dishonour others, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. (Agape) Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth.

It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres. (Agape)

Love never fails." (1 Corinthians 13:4-8a)

- 1. "(Agape) love is patient": it has a long fuse.
- 2. "(Agape) love is kind": it is more concerned about others than oneself.
- 3. "(Agape) love does not envy, does not boast, is not proud, does not dishonour others, is not self seeking": it doesn't tear down or humiliate others.
- 4. "(Agape) love is not easily angered": it doesn't quickly fly into a rage.
- **5.** "(Agape) love keeps no record of wrongs": it doesn't keep a scorecard of failures.
- 6. "(Agape) love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth": it is thrilled when others experience truth.
- 7. "(Agape) love always protects": it shelters from deceit and destruction.
- 8. "(Agape) love always trusts and always hopes": it never gives up.
- **9.** "(Agape) love always perseveres": it stays behind when others run away.
- 10. "(Agape) love never fails": it promises victory.

HOW 'AGAPE' LOVE WORKS IN YOU

A Working Definition...

Agape is the ancient Greek word for unconditional affection. It is the purest form of love imaginable...

I. HOW DOES AGAPE LOVE CHANGE US?

- A. Four Foundational Ways...
- 1. Agape love is received via our spirit...

"They asked each other, 'Were not our hearts burning within us while he talked with us on the road and opened the Scriptures to us?" (Luke 24:32)

2. Agape love reshapes our will...

"...do you show contempt for the riches of his kindness, forbearance and patience, not realizing that God's kindness is intended to lead you to repentance?" (Romans 2:4)

"...for it is God who works in you to will and to act in order to fulfill his good purpose." (Phil 2:13)

3. Agape love regulates our emotions...

"The acts of the flesh are obvious: sexual immorality, impurity and debauchery; idolatry and witchcraft; hatred, discord, jealousy, fits of rage, selfish ambition, dissensions, factions and envy; drunkenness, orgies, and the like. But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control." (Galatians 5:18-23a)



4. Agape love renews our intellect...

"Do not conform to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind..." (Romans 12:2)

We are not changed for God's love; we are changed by God's love.

Homework This Week:

Meditate on Romans 5:6-11: For while we were still weak, at the right time Christ died for the ungodly. For one will scarcely die for a righteous person—though perhaps for a good person one would dare even to die—but God shows his love for us in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us. Since, therefore, we have now been justified by his blood, much more shall we be saved by him from the wrath of God. For if while we were enemies we were reconciled to God by the death of his Son, much more, now that we are reconciled, shall we be saved by his life. More than that, we also rejoice in God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have now received reconciliation.

How does it make you feel to realize that God's love for you is unconditional (you don't deserve it, you can't earn it, but God loves you nevertheless)? How will you respond to that love?



IS 'AGAPE' LOVE FLOWING THROUGH YOU?

A Working Definition...

Agape is the ancient Greek word for unconditional affection. It is the purest form of love imaginable...

"One of them, an expert in the law, tested him (Jesus) with this question:

'Teacher, which is the greatest commandment in the Law?'

Jesus replied: '(Agape) Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind. This is the first and greatest commandment.

And the second is like it: (Agape) Love your neighbour as yourself."'

(Matthew 22:35-39; See also 1 John 3:11)

We are called to be rivers, not puddles.

Consider 2 Timothy 2:23-24: "Have nothing to do with foolish, ignorant controversies; you know that they breed quarrels. And the Lord's servant must not be quarrelsome but kind to everyone, able to teach, patiently enduring evil, **correcting** his opponents with gentleness. God may perhaps grant them repentance leading to a knowledge of the truth, and they may come to their senses and escape from the snare of the devil, after being captured by him to do his will."

BRAINSTORM AND STRATEGIZE
