



## **Daniel C. Silverman MD, MPA**

Daniel Silverman is an accomplished physician with executive leadership experience in healthcare organizations (Harvard Medical School, Washington University School of Medicine, BJC HealthCare System, Sinai Hospital of Baltimore), higher education (Harvard University, Washington University of St. Louis, Princeton University) and consulting organizations (CSC/APM Healthcare Consulting, Keeling and Associates Higher Education Consulting). Throughout his career he has shown the ability to think strategically and help develop great leaders and high performance teams to drive innovation.

Before joining MEDI (Morgan Executive Development Institute) as CMO/Senior Executive Leadership Coach in 2014, Dr. Silverman served as Chief Medical Officer of Sinai Hospital of Baltimore, the flagship acute care facility of LifeBridge Health System. The first physician to hold this position in the 150 year history of Sinai, Dr. Silverman developed the role reporting directly to the CEO which included leading all Chiefs of Service, the more than 1200 credentialed physicians and worked closely with the senior executive leadership team and the Board of Trustees. He was the physician champion for healthcare quality improvement and clinical effectiveness, clinical informatics, and physician integration strategy. He also served as the founding Executive Medical Director of Sinai Physician Partners, the hospital's multispecialty faculty group practice.

Prior to joining LifeBridge Health, Dr. Silverman was Chief Medical Officer and Executive Director of University Health Services at Princeton University. In his role as Chief Medical Officer, Dr. Silverman worked closely with members of the University's senior leadership to create coalitions dealing with critical university health, student and staff wellness, residential life and public safety issues. With a University-wide mandate, Dr Silverman facilitated collaborative efforts of the Campus Life units to design, develop and implement several innovative health and wellness initiatives including the Healthier Princeton Program, the Princeton Depression Awareness Program and the National College Depression Partnership.

During his time at Princeton, Dr. Silverman was co-founder of the Ivy-Plus Group of University Health Service Directors (comprised of health service directors from the Ivy League Schools plus Stanford, MIT, University of Chicago, and Duke) that shares best practices, benchmarks clinical and service quality, and collaborates on research in important areas of mental, physical and preventive health on university campuses.

Before assuming his duties at Princeton, Dr. Silverman was the Vice President for Clinical Effectiveness at BJC Healthcare, Washington University School of Medicine's healthcare system in St. Louis. In that role, he was responsible for building coalitions of departmental chairs, physician leaders, allied health professionals and administrators to develop and implement population-based healthcare programs across the system's continuum of care.

Prior to joining BJC Healthcare System, Dr. Silverman was a Senior Healthcare Consultant with the CSC/APM Healthcare Management Consulting Group. In both his BJC leadership and CSC/APM consulting roles, he worked closely with physician leaders, allied healthcare professionals, hospital and health system administrators in the redesign and continuous quality improvement of clinical delivery systems in community/teaching hospitals and academic medical centers in the United States and Canada.

Dr. Silverman earned his Bachelor of Arts, majoring in psychology and pre-medical studies at the University of Michigan, and his Doctor of Medicine degree at Northwestern University School of Medicine in Chicago. He completed his residency training at Boston's Beth Israel Hospital and Harvard Medical School. He received a Masters of Public Administration degree from the Kennedy School of Government at Harvard specializing in strategic leadership of healthcare organizations and is a graduate of the Boston Psychoanalytic Society and Institute.
